Thrift Shop Expansion (Barb Worwood)


As per the weekly updates from Lynda the Executives received your approval to expand into the space previously occupied by Hemp Hemp Hooray. This will approximately double our retail and work space.

A commercial contractor, Gibraltar Contracting, has been selected and the permits for the renovations have been submitted to City Hall. We received the keys for the new space on November 1st and did a quick tour. The initial plan is to keep our existing entry into the shop (the one into Hemp Hemp Hooray will be closed) and part of the wall where the Thrift Shop glassware is located will be removed to provide the entry into the new space. At the back of the shop, where we receive and sort the donations, we expect to open up the wall which will expand our work and storage area.

Now that we have access to the space more details will be reviewed with the contractor, and once the permits are approved then the timeline for the changes and the plan will be determined. As more details are known updates will be provided. It's an exciting time so stay tuned!

Ever wonder what happens to the clothing that we recycle at the Thrift Shop?

Throughout the week volunteers at the Thrift Shop sort through our donations and for those items that we are not able to sell, since they are more than gently loved, they are bagged and set aside. On a weekly basis Trans-Continental Textile Recycling (TCTR) picks up the recycling and we are reimbursed based on the weight of the materials.

As outlined on the TCTR's website, the benefits of this plan is that there is no textile waste. The useable clothing is sorted and shipped to developing countries mainly in Africa. For unwearable cotton and cotton blends, they are cut in their facility into wiping rags for industry use. For other unwearable items such as wool and acrylic they are made into thread and reused to make new clothing and textiles.

So when we put a sweatshirt, pants, and other clothing into the recycling, rather than into the garbage, it's good to know that this is helping the environment but also benefiting developing countries.

Did you know...

It takes 1,998 litres of water, 142 grams of chemicals plus the cotton to make one T-shirt.

Over 70% of the world's population wear second hand clothes.

300 million pairs of reusable shoes end up in landfills each year.

The average North American discards 31 kilos of clothing and textiles every year.

Further to the update at the GM regarding attending the October meeting of the Lower Mainland and Coastal BCAHA, here is a summary of the session:

MEETING OF LOWER MAINLAND AND COASTAL BCAHA

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 4TH, 2022

AT THE HOLIDAY INN, NORTH VANCOUVER

On October 4th we attended a meeting of the Lower Mainland and Coastal District BCAHA which was hosted by Yvonne Chard,

Director. Also in attendance were Diana Thornton, President BCAHA and Carole Murray, Vice President, BCAHA

The meeting started with the reading of the BCAHA Affirmation by all those present.

Diana Thornton gave a presentation on "The Importance of Communication". She said we need to get out the message of "Who we are. What we are. What we do". Why? To increase visibility in the community and attract volunteers. The areas to concentrate on were Members, Donors and Customers. How a simple Thank you can make a big difference. Some Auxiliaries hold Customer Appreciation Days.

Yvonne then introduced our Guest Speaker — Isobel MacKenzie, Seniors Advocate. Isobel said that there is a need to focus on Seniors raising money not just for seniors but for the whole community. She was amazed when she found out how many hours are given by BCAHA volunteers and the funds they raise. She went on to talk about the generational shift with so many services now only being offered on-line. Also how many seniors suffer from isolation and loneliness. Isobel also said that 45 percent of Seniors live on less than the minimum wage and 25 percent on less than \$21,000 a year. The minimum wage has increased by 40 percent in the last 5 years but pensions have only risen 14 percent.

After lunch Carole Murray, Vice President, BCAHA, gave a presentation on Auxiliaries and their support of Extended Care Facilities. Carole said this was a subject that was near and dear to her heart, and she wanted to ensure Auxiliaries maximized their efforts to assist their Extended Care Facility(ies). She gave us a handout, which she elaborated on, with suggestions of various actions that could be taken or expanded on by an Auxiliary.
